Reading task:

- 1. Where does Sleeping Cutie live?
- 2. What do the taxes contribute towards?
- 3. How long had Sleeping Cutie been asleep?
- 4. Is there any scientific evidence that a kiss could wake the prince?
- 5. Who wrote the letter?
- 6. Explain which features help you to recognise this as a letter.
- 7. What does the word "odious" tell us about the Wicked Queen?
- 8. How do the councillors feel about the idea of waiting for love's first kiss?
- 9. If you could write a letter back from Sleeping Cutie, what would be your main argument?
- 10. Why do you think the Wicked Queen wants to be left alone?

Writing task:

Today, I want to give you time to do something we haven't given you lots of time to do during this lockdown. Edit and re-draft! A REALLY important skill to master. So, taking your story from yesterday, I want you to edit and improve it.

If you have written lots and it seems like a lot to edit and you're wondering where to start, here are some sections for you to work through. Only concentrate on the section you are on at that time and slowly work through them all. So for example, if you start with spellings, ONLY check spellings in your whole piece!

PUNCTUATION:

- Are all your capital letters and full stops where they need to be?
- Are your commas in the correct places?
- Have you used inverted commas for speech and remembered to start a new paragraph for a new speaker?
- Do you need questions marks? Brackets? Is it effective to use dashes?

SPELLING:

- Are there words that look wrong in your writing? Underline them.
- For trickier words use a dictionary!
- Check homophones

VOCABULARY:

- Can you add or improve adjective to make your writing detailed?
- Use a thesaurus (they are available online)
- Can you include adverbs?

GRAMMAR:

- Have you missed out any words?
- Do you sentences make sense? What do you need to change if they don't?
- Do you need more sentences to make your story clear?

SENTENCES:

- Have you included a variety of sentence starters?
- Does your writing flow with lots of different sentence types? Are they short sentences? Relative clause sentences? Rhetorical questions?
- Can you up level some of the sentences you have to make them even more detailed or even more powerful or even more entertaining for the reader?

TOP TIP: Use different colours for each edit section.

Once your page is a complete mess of changes and brilliant editing, it's time to produce your final piece! This might be on the computer, or you could give yourself handwriting practice (remember, copying up your drafted and edited work is a VERY important skill...without final publication, we wouldn't have the wonderful books that are available to us today!) Maybe you could think of an exciting way to present your final stories? Maybe on a tea bag stained scroll to tie in with the fairy tale theme? Or make a fold out book to present your work? I'm sure you can get creative! Enjoy!
